There is a fire extinguisher and a first aid kit in Willow Cottage.

There are smoke and CO2 detectors throughout the property.

There is a no smoking policy in the property. A sand bucket is provided in the garden for use as an ashtray, if smoking outside the property only.

Check in time is 3 p.m. Check out time is 10 a.m. If you require a later check out, please ask and we will try to accommodate depending on next arrival. Likewise with check in where possible we will accommodate an earlier check in.

Keys and key lock

There will be one set of keys in the lock safe on arrival and one set in the property. The second set has a key fob which opens the five bar gate into the property. To open the gate just press the button on the left of the fob marked with an arrow, the gate shuts automatically behind you.

Should you require additional sets of keys please ask.

The five bar gate will usually be locked overnight but the fob will still open the gate. During this time however the green button will NOT open the gate.

Will be provided on contact from you 2 days prior to your arrival.

Security

The main gate to the driveway is controlled by the green buttons located inside and outside the property near the gate. The private garden of Willow Cottage has 3 gates, only one can be used for access for visitors. The other two are locked as they lead to the grounds of Carpenters Meadow.

There is a personal safe provided in the cupboard next to the entrance door.

Parking

Please make sure all visitor vehicles are parked in the bays provided for Willow Cottage adjacent to the property. There is ample room for two cars.

If you have more vehicles arrangements can be made to accommodate them, please be aware there is no street parking available close to the property.

Linen and cleaning services

We provide all bed linen for guests as well as one bath sheet and hand towel per person in addition to this we provide a separate hand towel in each bathroom. Beach towels are also provided, one per guest and these can be found in the storage drawers under the beds in the twin bedroom.

Cleaning services are not currently provided during your stay however we can arrange this for you, this would be an additional charge.

For two week stays or longer a change of all towels and bed linen would take place on a weekly basis.

CESSPIT

Like many country properties, Willow Cottage waste water travels to a cesspit on the grounds of Carpenters Meadow. Cesspits work very well as long as the balance of bacteria and water is allowed to perform its function. For this reason, we ask that only toilet paper is flushed and also you use the ECO products provided for cleaning and dish washing and never put bleach or any antibacterial products down the sinks or into the water system.

It is very important that the system isn't blocked with non human product, as such sanitary bins are provided in both bathrooms alongside the usual waste bin. Please do not flush face wipes, baby wipes, nappies or anything else down the toilet that should really be going into a bin.

The system will block if this occurs and it isn't pleasant for anyone when this happens.

Dogs are welcome in all parts of the property and the garden. Please use the Poo bin provided to clear any doggy deposits. We would ask people to use common sense in leaving dogs in the property, if you do decide to do this then the dogs must be crated both for the health and sanity of the dogs in a strange environment and also to prevent damage to sofas, beds etc.

We provide throws for the furniture downstairs when we have four-legged friends staying as we appreciate many of them like to sit on the sofa as much as we humans do. We also provide one large dog mat to lay on the floor and a couple of towels specifically for when they come in wet or with muddy paws, please make use of these if you need them.

Please keep your dog/s on a lead whenever leaving or entering the property including getting them into and out of your vehicle. This is purely to keep them safe as unfortunately delivery drivers don't always slow when they enter the premises and we would hate there to be any accidents. We keep our own dogs under strict control in the unlikely event they are at the front of the house in the driveway.

Rubbish & Recycling

There are rubbish and recycling bins in the kitchen, these can be found in a pull out unit on the central island. Please use them accordingly, as in most places now we have collections every other week. If the bin in the kitchen becomes full you can empty it into the wheelie bins for the cottage. These can be found outside under the stairs leading up to the master bedroom, green (recycling) black (rubbish).

Health and Safety

We ask our guests to use common sense regarding health and safety especially with small children. There are locks on all doors and gates including the French doors on the first floor leading to the steps. The driveway at Willow cottage is shared so vehicles may be present. When leaving the property, all doors and windows should be closed to protect from unwelcome visitors and rain!!

The BBQ can be used by guests during their stay, instructions are provided and care must be taken with gas canisters and lighting.

Banks

Petrol Stations/Garage services

There is strangely only one petrol station in Rye, Costcutters, located on the A259 as you come over the bridge entering Rye, turn right at the roundabout. There is another petrol station on the A259 towards Ashford, approximately 5 miles from Rye which is usually cheaper than Costcutters if you are heading that way. Hastings, as the main town in the area has petrol stations and shopping malls for the masses.

Willow Cottage is located near the villages of Udimore and Winchelsea in East Sussex, both about a mile away. The main town of Rye is 3 miles away and Hastings is 13 miles away. Willow Cottage was created in the summer of 2016 by Nina Mahaffey, to provide holiday accommodation to visitors to the area. It lies in the grounds of Carpenters Meadows which was built in 1967. From 1988-2002 Spike Milligan, the well-known comedy genius, author and poet lived at Carpenters Meadow. The incredible views to the South span from Dungeness nuclear power station in the East (15 miles) over the English Channel, the citadel hill of Winchelsea village to the town of Hastings in the West. The sandy beach of Camber Sands lies near Rye (3 miles) while the pebble and sandy beach of Winchelsea is the closer. (1 mile)

Willow Cottage and Carpenters Meadow lie on 'Dumbwoman's Lane'. According to the local legend, an unfortunate lady who lived there had her tongue cut out during the times when smuggling was rife in the area from the 15th to the 19th century. Whether it was as punishment for notifying the local customs officers to the deeds of the notorious 'Winchelsea smugglers' or to prevent her alerting them after witnessing them, the truth is unclear. The signs 'Dumbwoman's Lane', at the top and bottom of the lane are frequently used as photo spots and occasionally taken away completely by visitors apparently.

Spike Milligan

Terence Alan "Spike" Milligan KBE (16 April 1918 – 27 February 2002) was a comedian, writer and actor.^[1] The son of an Irish father and an English mother, his early life was spent in India where he was born. The majority of his working life was spent in the United Kingdom. He disliked his first name and began to call himself "Spike" after hearing a band on Radio Luxembourg called Spike Jones and his City Slickers.^[1]

Milligan was the co-creator, main writer and a principal cast member of *The Goon Show*, performing a range of roles including the popular Eccles and Minnie Bannister characters. Milligan wrote and edited many books, including *Puckoon* and his seven-volume autobiographical account of his time serving during the Second World War, beginning with *Adolf Hitler: My Part in His Downfall*. He is also noted as a popular writer of comical verse; much of his poetry was written for children, including *Silly Verse for Kids* (1959). After success with the ground-breaking British radio programme, *The Goon Show*, Milligan translated this success to television with *Q5*, a surreal sketch show which is credited as a major influence on the members of *Monty Python's Flying Circus*. He was the earliest born, longest lived and last surviving member of the Goons.

Milligan's 1960 application for British citizenship and 1961 application for a British passport were blocked by his refusal to pledge an oath of allegiance to the United Kingdom, his adopted home for most of his adult life.^{[2][3]} When the Commonwealth Immigrants Act removed Indian-born Milligan's automatic right to British citizenship in 1962,^[4] he promptly became an Irish citizen,^[5] exercising a right conferred through the automatic retroactive Irish citizenship of his Irish-born father.

Local area

Rye

Rye is a small town in the non-metropolitan county of East Sussex, within the historic County of Sussex, England, which stands approximately two miles from the open sea and is at the confluence of three rivers: the Rother, the Tillingham and the Brede. In medieval times, however, as an important member of the Cinque Ports confederation, it was at the head of an embayment of the English Channel and almost entirely surrounded by the sea.

Rye is officially a civil parish but with its historic roots has the status of a town; at the 2011 census it had a population of 4773. During its history its association with the sea has included providing ships for the service of the King in time of war, and being involved with smuggling gangs of the 18th and 19th centuries such as the notorious Hawkhurst Gang who used its inns such as The Mermaid Inn and The Olde Bell Inn, connected by secret passageway.

Those historic roots and its charm make it a tourist destination, and much of its economy is based on that: there are a number of hotels, guest houses, B&Bs, tea rooms and restaurants, as well as other attractions, catering for the visitor. There is a small fishing fleet, and Rye Harbour has facilities for yachts and other vessels. It has more antique shops than any other town apparently!

Hastings

Hastings is a historic town and borough in the county of East Sussex, within the historic county of Sussex, on the south coast of England. The town is located 24 mi (39 km) east of the county town of Lewes and 53 mi (85 km) south east of London, and has an estimated population of 90,254,^[2] which makes it the 66th largest settlement in the United Kingdom.^[3]

Historically, Hastings can claim fame from the Battle of Hastings, and later because it became one of the medieval Cinque Ports. Hastings was, for centuries, an important fishing port; although nowadays less important, it still has the largest beach-based fishing fleet in Europe. The town became a popular spot for 'taking the waters' (therapeutic bathing in the sea) in the 1760s, and then, with the coming of the railway, a seaside resort.

Winchelsea

Winchelsea is a small town in the non-metropolitan county of East Sussex, within the historic County of Sussex, England, located between the High Weald and the Romney Marsh, approximately two miles (3 km) south west of Rye and seven miles (12 km) north east of Hastings. The town stands on the site of a medieval town, founded in 1288, to replace an earlier town of the same name, sometimes known as **Old Winchelsea**, which was lost to the sea. The town is part of the civil parish of Icklesham.

It is claimed by some residents that the town is in fact the smallest town in Britain, as there is a mayor and corporation in Winchelsea, but that claim is disputed by places such as Fordwich. The mayor of Winchelsea is chosen each year from amongst the members of the corporation, who are known as freemen, rather than being elected by public vote. New freemen are themselves chosen by existing members of the corporation. Thus, in its current form, the corporation is

effectively a relic of Winchelsea's days as a 'rotten borough' (when Winchelsea elected two MPs but the number of voters was restricted to about a dozen, sometimes fewer).

The corporation lost its remaining civil and judicial powers in 1886 but was preserved as a charity by an Act of Parliament to maintain the membership of the Cinque Port Confederation. The mayor and corporation in Winchelsea now have a largely ceremonial role, together with responsibility for the ongoing care and maintenance of the main listed ancient monuments in the town and the Winchelsea museum.^[1]

Winchelsea constitutes neither a local government district, civil parish nor charter trustees' area.

In 2012, the village had the slowest broadband speed in the United Kingdom, with an average speed of 1.1Mbit/s, according to a survey done by uSwitch.

Winchelsea church

The first recorded mention of the church of St Thomas in Old Winchelsea came in 1215. It was named in honour of the Martyr, Archbishop of Canterbury, who was murdered in his own Cathedral in 1170. The town was then a flourishing seaport on the shingle, but in 1250 it was battered by a phenomenally high tide which 'flowed twice without ebbing with a horrible roaring and a glint as of fire on the waves.' Thirty-seven years later further floods virtually destroyed the town and changed the course of the River Rother.

Spike Milligan's famous grave 'I told you I was ill', albeit in Gaelic, lies at the North end of the Winchelsea cemetery which often draws a small crowd.

Winchelsea town should not be confused with Winchelsea beach, the latter being the houses along the coast road. Winchelsea town likes to consider itself the upmarket end with many of its aged inhabitants coming from the professional classes.

Bars, Pubs, Restaurants

The closest pubs are The Plough in Udimore and The New Inn in Winchelsea. Both do a hearty pub fare, and both are dog friendly.

The George Hotel

The bar at The George is a chic place for pre-dinner drinks whether or not you are eating at The George restaurant. Definitely the most modern in Rye!

The Mermaid Inn

The Mermaid is the other end of the spectrum to The George with cellars dating from 1156 and the building itself rebuilt in 1420. The rooms offer sloping ceilings, creaking floorboards, numerous staircases and no doubt a few ghosts! Experience a drink in the Giant's Fireplace Bar and imagine how the Hawkhurst Gang, local smugglers in the 1730s and 1740s, caroused in the bar. Can you see the secret passageway entrance?

The panelled restaurant provides an ideal ambience for the Rye tourist with two bar/lounges to enjoy an after dinner drink.

As featured in The Times 'Britain's 25 best places to eat at the weekend', we have built a reputation for delicious seasonal cooking, using abundant local produce such as lamb from the Salt Marshes to fish caught and delivered daily from Rye Harbour. Along with an interesting and varied wine list we have a great selection of craft beers and local ales including our own Standard Inn Farmer Ale.

Seafood

As you imagine on the coast, you can buy some of the finest and freshest seafood often caught overnight. Whether it is lobster, prawns, scallops or every type of fish, Rye and Hastings can entertain you.

Rye Bay Fish is located just over the bridge, 73 New Road, on the entrance to Rye itself by the bowling green.

Hastings Rock-a Nore in Hastings old town, turn left on the entrance to Hastings on the A259.

Nothing would be complete without a Fish and Chip shop. The 'Kettle of Fish' on the roundabout at the end of Rye harbour is just the ticket. (open every day 11am to 10pm)

Beware of the parking here. The parking lot behind the shop is a private enterprise with aggressive CCTV monitoring. You have to enter your car registration number and pay even for the shortest stay.

Day trips

Hastings old town is worth a visit. Much of the drama series 'Foyle's War' was filmed here. Hastings is still a working fishing town and the best place to pick up the freshest catch is Rock-a-Nore on the seafront. There is a large selection of seaside amusements which provides endless fun for children.

Ashford outlet centre is an excellent day trip for shopping. Most well-known brands are represented here at bargain prices.

For the past 88 years the **Romney, Hythe & Dymchurch Railway** has been an integral part of the landscape of the Romney Marsh. Known as "Kent's Mainline in Miniature", our World Famous one-third full size Steam & Diesel locomotives have powered their way along the 13½ miles of track from the Cinque Port town of Hythe, terminating in Dungeness; a National Nature Reserve and one of the largest shingle landscapes in the world. With 4 stations in between, all within walking distance of a beach, our railway provides you with an opportunity to explore this unique corner of Kent. Coast & country walks, with all manner of wildlife & flora to be seen, cycle rides, medieval churches and iconic Lighthouses are all on our doorstep. With excellent catering facilities available at some stations, our ever-popular Model Railway Exhibition, 1940's Museum and Play Park at New Romney Station, good station shops, free car parking and facilities to assist our Disabled visitors, RH&DR is the perfect any-weather day out.

Beaches

The closest beaches are Winchelsea and Camber Sands.

Camber Sands is a long sandy beach with dunes with summer activities and shops. The tide range can result in ½ mile differences in beach! Despite the very shallow water slope (where one can be 50 yards in the sea and only in knee deep), the tides must be respected. Flags advising of the dangers are used by the on beach coastguard. Parking fees apply in both car parks. Dogs are allowed on the beach during winter months but only on the west side during summer months.

Winchelsea beach is a pebble/sandy beach with relatively few amenities. There is no charge for parking. At high tide, the water shelves quickly allowing swimmers to swim close to the shore. The two hour window at low tide reveals a sandy strip perfect for dog walking. There is also a path close to the shore that passes the remnants of the Mary Stanford Lifeboat station and details the tragic history along to the Rye Harbour Nature Reserve. Bird Watchers will be especially interested in this walk.

Local events

Rye Bay Scallop Week
